Our state Delta Kappa Gamma president, Lori Richardson-Morphew, presented an excellent program about the detrimental results of too much exposure to technology for children! She gave statistics, specific examples, and showed some videos that displayed some sad realities about children's foregoing fun activities that most of us enjoyed as youngsters in order to play video games and spend time on social media. Alarming data about childhood cancers, social bullying leading to a surge in suicide statistics among children and teens, childhood obesity, and other sobering information highlighted the concerns about constant technology.

ening. Discussion followed the presentation about observations teachers presently in the classroom are reporting about behavioral issues associated with cell phones and other devices in the classroom.

Accompanying Ms. Richardson-Morphew to the Lambda meeting at Lucille's Roadhouse in Weatherford, was Joann Rogers, the president of Alpha Chapter in Oklahoma City.
