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Representative Anthony Moore Addresses Lambda Members

First-term State Representative Anthony Moore, of Clinton, was guest speaker for the Lambda Chapter meeting on September II, 2021. Moore represents District 57, which includes Beckham, Blaine, Caddo, Canadian, and Custer counties.

Moore is a graduate of Clinton High School, received a degree in Government and Legal Studies from Oklahoma Christian University and a law degree from Oklahoma City University School of Law. He has been practicing with the Christensen Law Firm, specializing in oil and gas leases, real estate, and property claims. Moore serves on several State Legislative Committees, including Energy and Natural Resources, Judiciary, Elections and Ethics, and Redistricting. His informative talk to Lambda Chapter included topics related to public school mandates and funding issues, the teacher shortage, the problems surrounding funding for on-line schools, versus "brick and mortar" public schools.

One bill co-authored by Moore, seeks to assist in the funding of school districts that have very little ad valorum income from wind or gas energy, businesses, and property. It would appropriate funds for small rural schools that struggle to find enough revenue to operate.
